Matt Kaplan, Ph.D., is an Associate Professor on Intergenerational Programs and Aging in the Department of Agricultural and Extension Education at Pennsylvania State University. He provides statewide leadership and support for initiatives and programs that strengthen intergenerational relationships and competencies in children, youth/4-H'ers, and families across the life span. Dr. Kaplan is the co-founder of statewide intergenerational networks in New York and Hawaii and has published several books including one for teachers and community activists entitled, *Side-by-Side: Exploring your neighborhood through intergenerational activities* (MIG Communications, 1994). He also is co-author of the program [*Grandparents Raising Grandchildren: Doubly Stressed, Triply Blessed*](#). His research interests include intergenerational programs and policies and their impact on human and community development as well as intergenerational program studies from an international perspective. He has a Ph.D. in Environmental Psychology from the City University of New York Graduate Center.
